EASTER OFFERING APPEAL 2018

Each year, the Methodist Church holds an Easter Offering collection, a tradition dating back to 1883 when women in Manchester collected £32 for Missionary work overseas from 'Christmas pennies' at family gatherings on Christmas Day. In March 1884, the London Districts distributed Easter envelopes and collecting bags asking for a penny a head, and collected around £100. In 1900, Women's Work raised £1,655 for the work of overseas missions.

Since that time, each successive Methodist women's movement has encouraged donations in support of God's mission. All the money raised goes to the World Mission Fund to be allocated for work in 65 Partner Churches around the world for the benefit of women, for example, in education and training, health care, and developing leadership roles.

In 2016 (the latest available statistics), £437,798 was raised. Please return your envelope for this year's offering by the end of the month. A circuit service for the Dedication of the Offering will be held at Newtown on Pentecost Sunday, 20th May at 6pm. Thank you.

An Easter Prayer from "Stages on the Way": Wild Goose Worship Group

Dear Friends

April 2018

Through Lent we've been preparing ourselves for the events of Holy Week ... or have we? It seems that so many people move from Palm Sunday to Easter Day with little thought for the journey between. Is Easter really about chocolate eggs and bunnies? I have enjoyed (and I'm enjoying!) the lambs in the field and the primroses that have taken the place of snowdrops on the verges as I travel to Welshpool. There are so many signs of spring and warmer weather, with greening and new growth. What does it mean for us to be an Easter people, a resurrection people? Recently, I've been reading about hope – *“Hope is not the conviction that something will turn out well, but the certainty that something makes sense, regardless of how it turns out.”*

Jesus does not go looking for death. Rather his crucifixion is the consequence of his commitment to life. It is because he chooses life for those around him, that he is put to death – but not before the seeds of imagination have begun to take root in the lives of those following him. His focus is on living out what “makes sense”, what it is that most reflects the life of God, and he is prepared to take the consequences, even if they are not pleasant or welcome.

If the crucifixion is the response of the powerful, the 'religious' and those in authority, to the kind of hope, freedom and imagination that Jesus shows in his life, then the resurrection invites us to look more deeply and see the ways in which Jesus' life does make sense; how we might pick up the threads of his life as an act of resurrection – how we can live his risen life. What on earth does that mean? The invitation is to live the kind of life that Jesus lived, a life of sacrificial giving, a life of love.

Many years ago, the Roman Catholic Church held a huge conference in Liverpool which they called 'Easter People'. For a number of years, the Methodist Church held a gathering for young people during the Easter holiday and that, too, was called 'Easter People'.

What could it mean for us in Welshpool to be an Easter people, a Resurrection people?

One day, I'll preach on 'the mother of the sons of Zebedee'! She isn't given her own name (was she yet another 'Mary' ... who knows?). We meet her at two critical moments in Matthew's Gospel. The first of these is when she approaches Jesus with a request that her two sons be given places of honour at his right and at his left when he comes into his kingdom (Matthew 20:20-28). The story differs from Mark's version, where James and John do the asking themselves (Mark 10:35-45). Why does their mother take the lead in

Matthew? Is it because she is a pushy mother trying to get the best for her sons? Is it because her sons don't have the courage to ask Jesus themselves? Is she pushed into it by her husband, Zebedee? What she hears is Jesus turn upside down what the world understands by greatness. What matters, instead, are the values of humility and servanthood, of choosing life, even if it costs life. Did she understand? I doubt it – even with the benefit of hindsight, we don't understand, so how could she have done ...

... and yet ... Matthew is the only gospel writer to include “the mother of the sons of Zebedee” explicitly among the women at the cross (Matthew 27:56). On Jesus' right and left are not her sons, but two criminals. The way Matthew describes both this woman and the idea of being on the right and on the left is so similar to the first story I referred to that, perhaps, Matthew wants his readers to make a connection between the two. This ‘mother of the sons of Zebedee’ is there with Jesus to the end, waiting with him, sustaining him with a sense of her presence. She's learned so much from what Jesus said about servanthood and greatness. Even before the act of crucifixion is complete she has begun to live out the resurrection. She is beginning to understand this new world with very different values that Jesus had tried to tell her, and others, about.

What more is there for us to in order to truly call ourselves an Easter people, a Resurrection people?
