## Updates

**An Open Meeting** to discuss ideas concerning the use of the generous legacy left by Sylvia Evans was held on 1<sup>st</sup> November and attended by 18 members. All the ideas which had been fed back from the questionnaire were discussed, and a short-list drawn up of ideas to take further:-

1. Replacement of church kneelers
2. TV Flat screen for Meeting Room (and camera, and monitor for lectern in church)
3. Digital Hymnbook
4. Construction of Canopy Porch for rear entrance from ramp
5. Professional survey of condition of stained glass (as preliminary to any other work that may be required, which would come under Maintenance)
6. Outreach Worker

A lengthy discussion ensued on the suggestion of an Outreach Scheme, and it was agreed that, before moving forward with this idea, we need (a) to be clear about aims and objectives, (b) we need to identify the needs in the community that we would be trying to address, and (c) we must consider whether any proposed scheme could be self-supporting once resources from the legacy had been used up.

It was known that Rev Bob had been involved in setting up an Outreach Scheme in his previous circuit, where a redundant chapel had been converted into "THE SHED", a woodworking venture run by Rev Bob and two retired members from the circuit, to enable people with a range of "issues" to meet weekly in a friendly and safe environment, with the opportunity to be creative and to develop social skills. It was agreed that a small group would meet with Rev Bob to seek his advice about setting up such a venture, and also to discuss with him any other ideas related to Mission and Outreach.

## **Ideas discussed at a meeting with Rev Bob on 21<sup>st</sup> November**

1. The Shed Scheme - the need for appropriate supervision and compliance to safety regulations were particularly stressed
2. 'Holiday at Home' Scheme - an annual few days' holiday based at church, with activities, outings and meals for those who would otherwise never have a holiday - elderly, those on their own etc.
3. Holiday Clubs -for children during school holidays
4. Community 'Out and About' Group - organising monthly outings, shared transport or hired minibus and driver
5. Information/Advice Bureau - drop-in centre with tea and coffee
6. Door-to-Door Outreach - small teams knocking on doors around the town, distributing cards with all details of what goes on at our church, including meetings of all groups that use our premises.
7. Explore what "hidden" talents there may be among our church family. There may be people who would like to use their talents/skills in some form of outreach - a challenge to "take risks" with whatever talent we may have (ref. Rev Marian's sermon on 19<sup>th</sup> November!)

These suggestions will be considered further and it is hoped that a proposal will be brought to the February Church Council.

### **CHRISTIANS AGAINST POVERTY    CAP**

Three members of the church attended a Money Coach Training Day at St Barnabas Church, Erdington, Birmingham, in October. This was a very informative day with some interesting speakers.

We have held a course for 5 young people over 3 Friday nights, when they have been shown how to make and manage their Budgets. Tea, coffee and cakes were available and all enjoyed the experience. We are planning a get together in the New Year to see how they are managing their budgets, and we are hoping to run another course in early 2018.
