Noah 2017

Dear Friends,

Over the years, in Methodist Churches, usually when a committee (perhaps a Church Council) has been required to do things in a particular way, someone will ask:

‘Who says we have to do it this way?’

and there is usually someone who will answer: ‘Conference’!

The Methodist Conference meets each year around the end of June and the beginning of July. This year its representative session, which includes ministers and laypeople, will be meeting from June 29th to July 5th in Nottingham with Ordination Services taking place on Sunday July 1st. these are ‘ticket only’ services and, because large churches are needed, we sometimes borrow from other denominations!

Decisions which affect us in small, local churches, are made by representatives to the Methodist Conference. Some of those representatives are there because of the office they hold within the Church nationally (or, to use Methodist language ‘Connexionally’), others are elected by Synods, so the Wales Synod elected a number of people to represent the churches of this Methodist District.

Our General Church Meeting elects representatives to the Church Council; the Church Council has representatives – the Church Treasurer, a Church Steward and people appointed by the Church Council – who attend the Circuit Meeting; the Circuit Meeting appoints representatives to the District Synod. So, you can see that the decisions affecting our church are made by people like you and me, people based in local churches in towns, villages and cities throughout Great Britain. These include representatives from Methodist Churches overseas and a small number from other denominations in this country. A while ago, I was at a national committee of which I’m a member and someone asked for the dates of this year’s Methodist Conference. The first to find the relevant dates was a Roman Catholic priest who is an ecumenical representative to our Conference!

For us, the pattern looks like this:

Welshpool Methodist Church has a

General Church Meeting which elects representatives to the

Church Council which appoints representatives to the

Welshpool and Bro Hafren Circuit Meeting which appoints
representatives to the

Wales Synod which elects representatives to the

Methodist Conference which makes the decisions that affect us.

Over the years, I have encouraged people who have never been to Conference to visit, if they are in the area. It's become more difficult to do that but, if you are in Nottingham at the beginning of July, drop into the University, where this year's Conference will be held. There are seats allocated for visitors and observers and stewards on duty to guide you.

I was a member of Conference for nearly 30 years yet, like you, there are times when I disagree with the decisions that have been made. As a Methodist Minister, I'm required to abide by the decisions of Conference! I've always been in awe of those lay people who take a week or more of their holiday from work to attend. That's some commitment!

If you are in Nottingham, near the University, do go in. Who knows what you could bring back ... maybe a longing to attend as a representative! Not everyone can do that so the Secretary of the Methodist Conference, the Rev'd Canon Gareth Powell, is coming to us on May 13th. Do be there to give him a brilliant 'Welshpool' welcome!
