'ALL WE CAN' HARVEST APPEAL 2017

Once again, our Harvest Envelope Appeal and profits from the Harvest Lunch are for the work of ALL WE CAN which traces its roots back to the 1940s when a Methodist minister, Rev Henry Carter, felt the Church had a responsibility to respond to the post-war refugee crisis in Europe. He pioneered the Methodist Refugee Fund as a personal initiative to raise money and collect supplies to relieve hunger and improve conditions among refugees.

In the 1950s, the remit expanded, and the Methodist Refugee Fund became known as the Methodist Relief Fund.

In the 1970s, with growing concern for global hunger and poverty, all Methodists were challenged to start giving 1% of their income to world development, and a new World Development Fund was launched alongside the Methodist Relief Fund.

In 1985, MRF and WDF were merged to form the Methodist Relief and Development Fund, and in 1991 MRDF's income reached £1million for the first time, and it was supporting work in over 50 countries. In 2004 the Indian Ocean Tsunami realised the biggest response to an MRDF Emergency Appeal to date, when over £5million was raised.

On 8th April 2014, MRDF became All We Can. The new name reflects its role and vision, as well as its Methodist roots and heritage, with its echoes of John Wesley:

“Do all the good you can, by all the means you can,
in all the ways you can, in all the places you can,
to all the people you can, for as long as you can.”

“CHIRP FOR JOY!” the 2017 Harvest Appeal, asks churches to 'chirp for joy' at God's creation and make a practical difference.

FROM REV MARIAN: 'History Beneath our Feet'

History beneath our feet! How many feet below our path had those first disciples walked? In places, the excavations revealed fascinating sights – the synagogue at Magdala and the village fish-salting factory; in Capernaum, the remains of the house of Simon Peter's mother-in-law within the house church ruins, within the walls of an octagonal church beneath the glass floor of a 20th century church and, walking towards the white walled synagogue built at the highest point of the community, the streets with the ruins of black basalt house walls.

Walking down the Mount of Olives following the steep path of the Palm Sunday walk, imagination takes over. Conversation on the journey, listening to the voices of companions, until we reach the Garden of Gethsemane and sit among the olive trees listening to the Jerusalem traffic and the echoes of another voice. The Anglo-Welsh poet, RS Thomas wrote:

'... his are the echoes we follow,
The footprints he has just left.'

Somehow, the echoes here come from a place not too far away; the footprints are only just ahead of us.

The Holy Land is called 'The Fifth Gospel', and for good reason.

Not everyone is able to visit but, for the majority who go on pilgrimage, the gospel stories come alive. To sit on the shore of the Sea of Galilee listening to the story of Jesus cooking breakfast for the disciples who are out fishing and to see a little fishing boat sail into view ... to see the remains of a 1st century fishing boat preserved following its discovery in the mud in the 1980s when the water level of the lake fell ... to stand at the foot of the steps leading to Temple Mount ... and imagine and remember.

You'll probably hear a few stories in my preaching as the months go by as I try to share with you some of the places Jesus would have been familiar with and the events that took place there.
