When Jesus got the news, he slipped away by boat to an out-of-the-way place by himself. But unsuccessfully—someone saw him and the word got around. Soon a lot of people from the nearby villages walked around the lake to where he was. When he saw them coming, he was overcome with pity and healed their sick.

Toward evening the disciples approached him. "We're out in the country and it's getting late. Dismiss the people so they can go to the villages and get some supper."

But Jesus said, "There is no need to dismiss them. You give them supper."

"All we have are five loaves of bread and two fish," they said.

Jesus said, "Bring them here." Then he had the people sit on the grass. He took the five loaves and two fish, lifted his face to heaven in prayer, blessed, broke, and gave the bread to the disciples. The disciples then gave the food to the congregation. They all ate their fill. They gathered twelve baskets of leftovers. About five thousand were fed.

The Message

Reflection

"Be still and know that I am God....", never have the words of our first hymn been so true as they have been for me during Lock Down.

Knowing how some people have, and indeed are still struggling, I feel very fortunate that this time has been almost liberating for me. With no rush or pressure to be somewhere/everywhere, there has been a new peace in my life. Lock Down has meant an opportunity to Look Deeper.

We may be locked down socially but our spirits, our minds and our thoughts are still free. I have spent a lot of time in my back yard, surrounded by my new "pot-garden" and felt very, very close to God. My Looking Deeper has taken me down many paths. I have been happy and sad, angry and forgiving, I have felt despair and I have felt empowered. Through it all I have been so aware of God and his sustaining presence in my life, no matter what happens.

It was with this in mind that I began today's worship with words from Psalm 17. There is such assurance in the psalmist's voice, a certainty that his prayer will be heard. He knows that his God is a loving God, prepared to put out his hand to all those who put their trust in him. There is so much here that is positive. My sister has been posting positivity images everyday on Facebook, the majority of these seem to be from the natural world where trees, plants and flowers continue to grow and flourish. Recently she "borrowed" one of my pictures taken in the Redwood Glen just outside Welshpool. It shows tree structures, three or four of them, growing tall and strong from the trunk of a fallen tree. The tree was felled by a storm in 1963 but its root system remained intact allowing the branches on its topside to continue to grow towards the light. I wonder if now is the time to draw on the roots of our faith to be stronger spiritually and grow closer to God?



I love the Psalms, they are definitely written to be heard and understood by all people. Whether they are laments, poems of rousing encouragement or songs of praise and thanksgiving they have their own special energy which still speaks to the reader today, just as they spoke to the Israelites. What could be more positive than

"Everything God does is right -

The trademark on all his works is love."

Whatever is happening in life, whatever situation or frame of mind we find ourselves in, if we love God he is always there for us.

During my Looking Deeper I have been wondering why I always favour the "tried and trusted", why do I content myself with the same old, wellused methods of doing things? Why am I not more adventurous, more ground-breaking, more innovative? Maybe I should update my thinking! It is only a small step but a very positive one for me to have used the Message Bible for our readings today.

Both of the readings, although very different show the overwhelming love and generosity of God.

Jesus needed more than social distancing when he heard of the death of John the Baptist. He actively sought to be alone, to find the peace and quiet in which perhaps to reflect on what had happened; to be sad, perhaps even to consider his own future. He did not find the space he needed but he put his own worries and concerns to one side in order to help those who needed him. He healed many people that day under difficult personal circumstances. Recently, many, many people have done just what Jesus did. They have put their own fears and sorrows on hold in order to help those who need them. They continue to do so, despite the toll it is taking on their own physical and mental health, and we remember them in our prayers.

Perhaps the disciples were worried about the strain the day had put on Jesus or perhaps they just wanted him to themselves for a little while. Jesus had other ideas, the crowd must be fed. Despite the apparently meagre rations available, after Jesus had prayed and broken the bread, the food was shared out and five thousand were fed with plenty left over. These actions of Jesus, praying and breaking the bread look forward to the Last Supper and to our own Communion Service. Show them your love.

For all those throughout the world for whom this pandemic has made life even harder.

Show them your love.

For politicians and world leaders who have difficult decisions to make and are faced with some hard choices.

Show them your love.

For everyone who has put themselves on the front line and dedicated themselves to making a difference.

Show them your love.

For all church communities here and abroad who are working and praying for each and everyone inside and outside their fellowship.

Show them your love.

And finally we pray for each other and ourselves, within our own faith community; we pray that you will continue to show us your love.
